Science Curriculum Connections with Mr. Hiben, Science Supervisor

Science instruction is largely focusing on science practices and measurement. Students can be found immersed in characteristics of life, density, the metric system all while learning how to think like a scientist. The skills and concepts reviewed in September will be used throughout the school year.

The science department is also preparing for a day long training event (9/29) on how to effectively use the new Vernier probe-ware they recently acquired. The new equipment and training will allow lab activities to have an additional

quantitative component and give students a more authentic experience.

American Sign Language

Level 1 American Sign Language students are learning how to introduce themselves in ASL. They are also learning the alphabet and how to spell words that do not have a designated sign, such as the names for people,

places and certain things. We have begun using furrowed eyebrows as a non-manual grammatical principle. Students are learning that furrowed eyebrows are expected when asking a WH-question word. (who, what, where, when, why, how many, how much & how). We have also begun Glossing. Glossing is when we translate written English word in ASL structure.

The fall 2016 athletic season is underway for the Jefferson High School Falcons. All of our student athletes have prepared for successful seasons. Instructional Technology Curriculum Connections with Kelly Villa, Instructional Technology Supervisor

The science and social studies departments are utilizing online textbooks. Additionally, these departments have adopted a one to one initiative. The teachers are expanding their use of Google Apps for Education (GAFE) utilizing various apps and extensions, as well as parent

notifications. This school year we have increased our laptop carts from 11 in 2015 to 25 in 2016. With the increase in technology, we are looking improve our PARCC preparedness and readiness as we increase student rigor and achievement in all academic areas. The student

utilization of additional laptops addresses the needs of our digital learners in today's classrooms.

Math and Business Curriculum Connections with Dr. Petric, Math and Business Supervisor

The mathematics department submitted three new course proposals to the Board of Education – Algebra I Honors, AP Computer Science Principles, and AP Calculus BC. All three courses were approved and will begin to be offered for the 2017-2018 school year. Additionally, over the summer the mathematics curriculum framework was updated and aligned to the New Jersey Student Learning Standards. The mathematics department bought a one year Kuta

software site license. This will empower teachers to do customizable assignments and assessments without the loss of meaningful time.

The business department submitted eight new course proposals. Students could receive college credit through five courses: AP Microeconomics, AP Macroeconomics, Accounting Honors CLEP, Introductory Business Law Honors CLEP, Marketing II Honors CLEP. Additionally,

students may enroll in three highly rigorous business classes: Advertising and Promotion, Entrepreneurship, Sports and Entertaining Marketing.

Fine and Studio Art, Related Arts & Social Studies Curriculum Connection with Mr. Papa, Supervisor

In JTHS social studies classes we have successfully integrated our online textbook in cooperation with the laptop carts to enhance our instructional practices and promote deeper student engagement. In addition, our social studies teachers have established Google Classroom as their learning management system to further extend the reach of their instruction to outside of the

school day. Through Google Classroom, students are able to participate in online discussions, complete formative assessments, and access their classroom resources at any time.

In Robotics and Engineering our students have been using the Maker Bot 3D printer to produce the products they are creating online. The students built a tshirt launcher that was used at the fall pep rally to launch Falcon t-shirts.

The Wood shop is designing projects for the school year and are using the new band saw and lathe to build and create incredible masterpieces. Mr. Warncke attended an incredible workshop this past summer and is looking to challenge his students to create innovative projects with the knowledge he acquired.

rent JTHS senior, has been named a Commended Student in the 2017 Merit Scholarship Program. The competition is highly competitive in the state of New Jersey and Commended Students are in the top five percent of the more than 1.6 million students who entered the 2017 competition for the PSATs nationally.

Upon receiving this distinction, Sokiran was humble about her achievement. Although Commended Students do not continue in the competition for National Merit Scholarships, some of these students do become

Special Education Curriculum Connection with Mr. Rebholz, Special Education Supervisor

Students who participate in our transition program at JTHS are exposed to internships and paid employment in fields that they are interested in pursuing after graduation. The process started early this year with Ms. Wildermuth's transitions class completing a web quest that helped the students explore different career clusters and occupations. The transition program, under Mrs. Thomas, partnered with local businesses and organizations such as The Hilton-Garden Inn, McDonald's, Little Learner Academy, Jefferson Lumber, Headley Lumber, Shop Rite, National Church Residences, The Westwind Manor, Pomptonian Food Services, P.G. Chambers School, and

the Olive Garden. Students in the Transition program have gained real-world experience in the career of their choosing through Structured Learning Experiences.

Mrs. Vanderbok's class continues to volunteer at the thrift store run by the Milton United Methodist Church every Tuesday. They help fold clothes, vacuum, price merchandise and straighten shelves. They also help out the food pantry by going food shopping at Shop Rite. They assist at the food pantry twice a month to help them set up the food for those in need. Her biology class has been learning about cells and last week got together with

Mrs. Hopper's AP Biology class to look at cells through microscopes.
