

Children are often screened for ASD at an early age during well-child medical visits. Standard screening is based on a caregiver questionnaire. But this method has proven less accurate in real-world health care settings than in research studies. So scientists have been working to develop accurate, easy-to-use screening tools to improve early detection.

Two years ago, a research team at Duke University reported promising results from a prototype mobile app that could detect distinctive eye gaze patterns in toddlers who were later diagnosed with ASD. For their latest study, the researchers developed and tested a new tablet-based app called SenseToKnow. This experimental app collects data not only on the child's eye gaze but also on facial expressions, attention, head movements, and other behaviors related to ASD.

OSEP Releases New Fast Facts on Children Identified with Intellectual Disability

A recent Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services (OSERS) blog released a new Office of Special Education Programs ([OSEP](#)) [Fast Facts: Children Identified with Intellectual Disability](#), which explores their Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), Section 618 data. This Fast Fact takes a closer look at their data on children whose primary disability is intellectual disability.

Just a couple data highlights for School Year (SY) 2021-2022 include:

- The percentage of students with disabilities identified with intellectual disability was 6.02%. States reported a range from 2.29% to 14.82% of students with disabilities identified with intellectual disability.
- Students identified with intellectual disability were more likely to be served inside a regular class less than 40% of the day than all students with disabilities (13% and 47%).
