The Athletic Department hosted a very successful Salute to Service Night on September second. Over fifty local Veterans and their families were honored during a pre-game ceremony. NEWS FROM THE FIRST MONTH OF SCHOOL

Ellen T. Briggs: Kindergarten students spent the first week of school getting to know one other and acclimating to their new school. Students engaged in activities to build their classroom community. In Art class, kindergarten and preschoolers listened to the story Where the Wild Things Are by Maurice Sendak. First graders listened to the story It Came in The Mail by Ben Clanton.
