From Mrs. Maxwell: All seniors are currently working on individual 20Time projects. Based on Google's Genius Hour, 20Time allows students to pursue an interest of their choosing. After pitching ideas to their classmates and teacher, students begin researching what is necessary to bring this idea to fruition and planning how to effectively utilize their time. In addition to documenting progress through pictures and videos, students are maintaining blogs to not only show the process and progress, but also to reflect on their project and make changes if necessary. Some of this year's projects include upcycling clothing, creating a YouTube channel with a series of videos focused on correcting myths about the deaf community, reducing a household's carbon footprint, learning the artistic technique of stippling, spreading happiness through random acts of kindness, and learning self-defense techniques. Students will create a final reflective presentation focused on what was learned throughout the process of the 20Time project.
