


### School Connections : JTHS Clean up 2018

On April 26th students at Jefferson Township High School cleaned up the middle and high school campuses. The Environmental Club sponsored the event and were joined by members of the track and golf team along with other students and faculty to total over sixty volunteers. They collected more than fifty bags of garbage and recycling. By holding the clean-up, the club became eligible to receive a grant of \$500.00 from the Morris County Municipal Utilities Authority through their “Slam Dunk the Junk” program. The money is to be used to buy recycling containers for the high school. In the past, the club has been able to purchase recycling containers for the sports fields, the cafeteria and the foyer of the school through these grants. The Environmental Club also has adopted a hiking trail in the Mahlon Dickerson Reservation. They hike their trail once a month, keeping it clear of debris and reporting on its condition to the Morris County Parks Commission.



## Athletics Connection:

As the Spring, that brought us a lot of rain and schedule changes, winds down we are excited of the May accomplishments of all of our athletes.

- Matt Cappello became the second fastest player in JTHS Boys Lax history to reach 100 career points in the Falcons win over Kittatinny. The Boys Lacrosse team also claimed their 4th consecutive Pooley division championship while Coach Reid collected his 100th win in the Blue and Gold. Hunter Good and Ian Prezwodek recorded their 100th and 200th career points, respectively.
- Faith Coyle placed 4th in the freshman 1600 meters at the Morris County Frosh/Soph Championships.
- Remi Makinde grabbed the 100m 5th place medal with Quincy Jones taking 4th. Tyler Lipchus-Wong took home 4th place in Discus.
- Golf, Finished 7th place in the MCT tournament out of 24 teams. Zach Costanzo 81, Ryan McBride 90, Tommy Heslin 92, JJ Mallory 93. Zach finished 16th out of 96 golfers.
- Boys Volleyball avenged an early season loss to claim their share of the Morris County Title while also winning the WJVL Championship. The boys team won a thrilling 3-game match with county rival Dover on our home floor Wednesday which propels them into the State Semi-Final where they will travel to Fair Lawn.
- Softballs Morgan Carr delivered her 100th career strikeout vs Vernon in state play.
- Baseball is the state 13 seed and has upset the 4-Westwood and the 5-High Point. The boys will travel to Pascack Hills and take on the top seed, number 5 ranked team in NJ, on Tuesday.
- Soccer's Liam Fitzgerald won the Bob and Matt Keegan Memorial Scholarship from the Morris County Youth Soccer Association.
- Alicia Boucher and Martin Kuras were honored at the Morris County Scholar-Athlete banquet this past week while Anthony Johnson was named an NJSIAA Scholar-Athlete and received a \$500 scholarship.

## World Language, ESL and Music Connection: Mrs. Kozlowski

After completing the national AP French exam, students in the AP French class brainstormed topics they have always wanted to know more about. During our last weeks of the school year, they are delving into more French film (*Huit femmes* and *Les Intouchables*), poetry, art, French publicity, and French games.

*The Jefferson Township High School DECA/FBLA organizations attended the New Jersey DECA/FBLA State Conference in late February and early March due to their successful performance at the regional conference at Ramapo College.*

*DECA/FBLA are clubs that require a lot of time, effort, and dedication. To qualify for national championships, the national candidates must complete a 30 page financial plan paper and a 20 minute presentation on the paper. Both are graded, and Jefferson was awarded third place. One of the DECA national qualifiers from Jefferson, Abby Buccieri, wanted to give some advice to prospective and current DECA and even FBLA members.*

*“A lot of preparation and practicing...all did pay off in the end,” said Buccieri.*

## Exceptional Connection:

Mrs. Mason’s 12th grade Language Arts class is currently reading *A Raisin In the Sun*. Unit components studied include conflict of identity, coping with conflict, social concern, community, and tolerance. Students are able to compare and contrast the American Dream between characters in *A Raisin In the Sun* to previously learned literature, *Death of A Salesman*.

The 18-21 program met up with Sparta High School at Sparta Lanes to participate in a combined CBI trip to focus on social skills. Everyone had a blast! The Resource Math of Finance class will be winding down the year by looking at apartments and salaries to determine what they can afford, and preparing on how to budget to pay bills.

Mrs. Vanderbok’s Life Skills History class learned about World War II and island hopping through a classroom simulation. The students had to strategize how to “hop” from one island to another to get close to Japan without getting attacked by the enemy. In their study of the Cold War, they also learned about the Berlin Airlift through a classroom activity. The students problem solved and came up with the solution to use paper planes to fly food and coal through the blockade. They saved the starving West Berliners!

Ms. Kolodny’s Career Exploration class has been learning about networking, and the people in their own personal network that can help them gain information about jobs. Seniors in Ms. Kolodny’s Transition Education class just completed their “Personal Budget” projects. While working on these projects, students had to create a personal budget according to their monthly expenses. Student’s had a great time researching their chosen occupation, finding different accommodations based on their occupations location, and then creating a monthly budget plan. Lastly, sophomores in the Career and Consumer Awareness class have been researching more about our community here in Jefferson, and what makes Jefferson so special!
