

AP Psychology: Summer Assignment

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Course Description: About the AP Psychology Course The AP Psychology course introduces students to the systematic and scientific study of human behavior and mental processes. While considering the studies that have shaped the field, students explore and apply psychological theories, key concepts, and phenomena associated with major units of study, including biological bases of behavior, cognition, development, learning, social psychology, personality, and mental and physical health. Throughout the course, students apply psychological concepts and employ psychological research methods and data interpretation to evaluate claims, consider evidence, and effectively communicate ideas.

College Course Equivalent: The AP Psychology course is equivalent to an introductory college-level psychology course.

Prerequisites: There are no prerequisites for AP Psychology. Students should be able to read a college-level textbook and to express themselves clearly in writing.

Exam Overview: The AP Psychology Exam assesses student understanding of the skills and learning objectives outlined in the course framework.

Abstract

How do we know what we know about human behavior? How did Piaget revolutionize our understanding of intellectual development? What did Pavlov really discover about salivating dogs? What is the story behind Masters and Johnson's research into human sexual response? These and many other questions are answered in this [volume]. Roger R. Hock describes and explains 40 of the most influential studies that have shaped our understanding of human behavior during psychology's brief history.

Each study is presented within a consistent format, including: a brief introduction and overview of historical events leading up to the study; the theory and hypotheses underlying the research; the research design and methods used to carry out the research; a clear summary of the results in non-technical, non-statistical language; an interpretation of the findings based on the authors' discussion in the original article; an exploration of the study's significance to the field of psychology; a discussion of the subsequent research launched by the study as well as criticisms of the research; a brief sampling of very recent applications of the original study's findings.
